Safe Babies Court- Sauna McCloskey and Helen Sullivan	Transforming the child welfare system so that every baby, toddler and family heals and thrives. The discussion and design phase was started a little over a year ago and presentations are now starting in the community. These are the main key aspects of safe babies court What is Safe Babies Court?	
	New approach to working with families of infants and toddlers in the Child Welfare system. It may be referred to as an Early Childhood Court.	
	The science is clear: the first 3 years of life is the MOST CRITICAL phase of brain development and lays the foundation for lifelong interactions and perceptions of the world.	4:15-
	Through a coordinated team approach, families meet every other month to identify family strengths and needs, resources/referrals to overcome barriers and discuss action steps to work through safety threats/risks and working towards reunification.	4:45
	Participation is voluntary	
	Status review court hearing are held every 60 days to demonstrate progress on reunification goals, identify any remaining needs or referrals to address safety risks/threats, discuss parenting time interactions and/or make decisions on reunification	
	Why we need Safe Babies Court?	
	Every 6 minutes a baby or toddler is removed from their parents in the US due to neglect or abuse and sent to live out of home placement.	
	Children under 3 enter into Foster Care at a higher rate than any other group

At 24.5% WA has the 3rd highest rate for Foster Care entry for children from ages 0 to 12 months.

Dependency filings have increased over the past 3 years in Clark County, 45% pf those were children under the age of 2.

SBC will also address racial inequities. Children's and families in the BIPOC population have a high representation in the Dependency courts and they are working to change that.

Family Teams

- Meets every other month that includes the parents, social workers, attorney, service providers, parent allies, resource/caregivers and is facilitated by a community coordinator
- Takes a child-centered strengthsbased approach to review protective factors and needs of each family member and work on action plans for reunification goals as well as discussing the concurrent plan

Active Community Team

- · Currently recruiting members
- Meets 4-6x/ year initially
- Assists in sharing resources and identifying service gaps;
- Intentional partnerships to streamline processes and remove access issues
- Reviews data for system reform and/or disparities

They are currently recruiting members to their network to increase collaboration and their Active Community Team.

Statewide FYSPRT Meeting Feedback- Michelle Karnath	 Strengths and appreciations about non-emergency medical transportation. Quite a few positive experiences with Med Transport, occasionally there are bad drivers but they are few and far between. Staff have been very helpful even in last minute situations. Are your Regional FYSPRT participants experiencing any of the following concerns related to non-emergency medical transportation. If yes for any of these challenges, please add a few sentences to describe the challenge/experience in your region/system. Challenge 1 - transportation between communities Challenge 2 - drivers are not trained to work with children and youth who experience behavioral health challenges Driver are not trained to deal with Mental Health. Challenge 3 - exceeding the speed limit, dropping child off after dark at the wrong address. Transportation broker phone lines close at 4pm Call back from the system when on a wait is hit or miss. If you are on hold at 4:30pm you are disconnected, this was noted by multiple individuals and providers. Some families only have so many minutes on their phone and being on hold for an hour to then be disconnected is a significant barrier. Inconsistent approach to speed, either significantly under or over. Challenge 4 - if there is a grievance process, families, youth and providers cannot easily access it 	5:15- 5:25
