

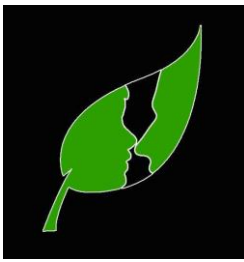

Graduate from High School</li> <li>2. Engage in Advanced, College Preparation Coursework</li> <li>3. Start College after High School</li> <li>4. Graduate from College</li> </ol> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• They serve 1000 students.</li> <li>• They've got summer programming for eligible students.</li> <li>• They're hosted by WSU, but specifically working off of a federal grant so not focused on promotion of WSU specifically.</li> <li>• They stick with students and follow them through the entirety of the process of building support, getting through school, getting into college, and graduating from college.</li> </ul>	4:25 - 4:50



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Information: CultureSeed	CultureSeed, Behavioral Health Director, Kay Alton <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Provide year-round connection to nature, self and others.</li> <li>• They believe access to the outdoors is a social determinant of health.</li> <li>• They provide one on one and group mental health services.</li> <li>• They support students through their school and beyond.</li> <li>• Their population is 80 - 90% POC.</li> <li>• They hire previously engaged students as guides, as peer support for the incoming students.</li> <li>• They have a large number of partnerships with local organizations to work with as many people as they can.</li> <li>• The program is also offered as a juvenile detention alternative for youth within the justice system.</li> </ul>	4:50 – 5:15
